The Hare was recently contacted about a new environmental initiative by East Suffolk Council and Norse to create more wildlife conservation areas across the region. They are encouraging town and parish councils to highlight areas which could be "rewilded", i.e. grass left to grow

Emma's Column

I have to say it was lovely to see so many parishioners logging onto Zoom for the Parish Council meeting on 10th March. Two particular agenda items appear to have been the cause: a planning application for the new development at Valley Farm and an item regarding properties in the village which have been standing empty for some time. To answer questions on both we were joined from the Heveningham Hall Estate by Lois Hunt, Matt Bostock (Business Manager) and Argus Hardy (Estate Architect).

After the usual updates the open forum heard from a parishioner concerned about the state of the road and verges at the entrance to Valley Farm from Brick Kiln Lane; the access is too narrow for larger vehicles to negotiate. We were informed that the Estate intend to widen the entrance. It was suggested that traffic was made to enter the site from the Barrels Hill end of the lane rather than through the village which they have promised to look at as an option.

Argus and Matt gave a brief presentation of the proposed Plant and Boiler house adjacent to the Community Orchard. Questions were raised regarding potential emissions and noise which we were told were within building control requirements. However, concern was raised from the majority regarding the site's proximity to the village. After some debate it was agreed that they will explore the options to re-site the development. The Councilors agreed to approve the plans in principle but highlight the need to explore site alternatives. We have since had an update from Matt Bostock: they have taken all considerations on board and "we think we have a solution that will please all parties". Once plans are firmed up they will share them with us at the next meeting in May. A time extension to the planning application has been requested.



We then moved to the subject of properties owned by the Estate, namely The Old School House opposite the Church and The

Forge in Bridge Street. Lois Hunt informed us that their current projects have been delayed which has had a knock-on effect with work on other areas. They are hoping to have planning consent for the Forge later in the year (potentially to demolish and rebuild) and may have to look at selling The School House.



Those were the days.. well-deserved refreshment after the village clean up in 2013!

Other items arising included a village clean-up day, which we haven't been able to do for some time. This will take place on Sunday 18th April. Please come along and help – meet at The Hub at 10am and pick your task. Unfortunately, due to the restrictions we won't be able to supply the usual cuppa and bacon 'sarnie' so you may want to bring your own refreshments.

We have received a grant from East Suffolk Council to clean the War Memorial on the Green. Initially we will have it steam cleaned and then assess any further restoration to the lettering etc.

Finally, we are excited to be able to host our Annual Parish Meeting at The Hub in public! This will take place on 19th May at 6.30pm. The usual COVID-19 requirements will be followed, with social distancing and masks required whilst moving around the building.

Budding Ideas

Officially British Summer time has arrived... the weather of course might need a reminder as we can still see cool days and chilly nights. Frosts remain on the cards - last year we had a snap frost on 26th May, one of the latest I recall. A reminder not to rush to get plants or seeds in that might not appreciate a sudden drop in temperature.



However, daylight hours are longer, temperatures are on the up and the garden is well and truly bursting into life, with bulbs well into their

stride, new growth from the previously hidden crowns of hardy perennials and bright, fresh leaf buds on trees and shrubs bursting into vibrant reds, oranges and citrus greens.

April and May are busy months and the perfect time for cutting back early blooming shrubs and straggly perennials alongside tidying dead materials from last year – which we are now being encouraged to leave over-winter. Most of us should be able to find an unobtrusive corner of the garden where tired perennials and leaves can be left to provide



shelter and safety for a wide range of garden creatures.

Early spring-flowering shrubs can be pruned directly after flowering is over – such as Forsythia

and Ribes. Take out one third of the older flowering stems to about a foot to encourage the production of younger branches which form the flowering stems for next year and also prune for a tidier shape. Smaller plants such as Salvia and Fuschia can also be cut back to a side shoot or leaf node (where the bud is produced). If they are getting a bit woody they will benefit from a harder crop to just a few inches. Feed after pruning with fish/blood/bone, bonemeal or Growmore and fork or water in around the base of the plants. Take care if you have dogs as they are likely to want to eat it, which really isn't the idea at all!

Plants of the month:



Magnolia stellata. Every garden should have a Magnolia, even the smallest. This little beauty, 'Star Magnolia', is a must - up to 10ft, it's deciduous, with furry leaves appearing in late

Spring which burst into brilliant white star shaped flowers. Easy, unfussy and a little gem in the garden.-

Another essential task at this time is the division of established perennials; over time their core becomes old and woody and growth occurs on the outside. Every 3 years or so lift the whole clump and, using a sharp knife or spade, split the healthy outside into about four or five chunks and chop off and discard the old woody growth. The 'new' clumps can be split further but don't make them too small. These can be re-planted either in the same area or put in other parts of your border. Work a little compost into the planting holes and water well. A great way to increase both your plants' health and your stock for free!

Climbing plants should be rapidly putting on growth and to avoid a tangled mess it is advisable to tie in the new growth as often as possible. Climbers such as roses, clematis, passion flower, etc. will need to be trained along supports to provide a good open shape. Do not tie in too tightly and use a soft twine to avoid damaging the delicate new stems.



Lawn mowing should be well under way by now. In order to thrive the lawn needs a little help and now is the time to start. In April, apply a combination lawn feed and weed to

encourage a good healthy green lawn whilst treating emerging broad leaf weeds and killing off moss. The moss will turn black as the treatment takes effect and sometimes the grass does a little too but do not be alarmed, this is part of the process. It then needs scarification and aeration; rake out the dead and accumulated thatch and spike with a long tined fork to allow oxygen to the roots - essential in a good healthy lawn. The aerating holes will stay effective for longer by brushing in some dry sharp sand.

With all this activity, even with longer days, it sometimes feels that there are just not enough hours in the day. It can be quite overwhelming but don't be put off; there is always time to find a secluded corner of your garden where you can just sit, enjoy the sum of all your efforts and relax.... a glass of wine may help!

Euphorbia. Evergreen, architectural plant for every site, ranging from up to 8ft tall Euphorbia Mellifera and little Euphorbia Myrsinites, a low growing ground cover. Citrus green flower bracts and generally bluey waxy leaves.



Chaenomeles japonica (Japanese Quince). Great deciduous shrub that can be trained pretty much wherever; copes with most soils in sun or shade and its

flowers are followed by golden fruits in the Autumn. Best grown against a wall or trained over a structure. Colours vary from scarlet to white.



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




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Weather report: February - March 2021

Two more months in lockdown since my last report but the weather seems to have followed seasonal normality to date. The last two months have performed accordingly, with snow in early February followed by Mad March winds. I recorded a maximum wind gust of 48.99mph on the 11th March in the low of Huntingfield along with nearly equal gusts on a couple of other days. Temperatures have varied widely with a max. of 14.9C and a min. of -6.3C in February and a max. of 14.1C (likely to be exceeded in the next couple of days) and a min. of -3.2C in March.



The weather has shown a very see-saw movement with mild being replaced by cold and generally following the pattern set by the jet stream: this pattern will continue for a while yet, I think.

I've not mentioned rainfall but, as you are well aware, there has been some! February was drier compared with last year but the opposite is true of March - the differences can be seen in the table. Cumulatively this year there have been 7.11" (180.6mm) of rain compared with 6.48" (164.6mm) in 2020. The continuing trend of less sunshine is still notable but hopefully will change very soon.

See you in a couple of months, but stay safe, we aren't out of the woods yet!

Millennium Green Community Orchard



Look out for the new trees in our orchard

You may notice some new activity in the Community Orchard. The original trees, planted over a number of years had been grafted onto a root stock that was not suitable to the soil on the green which is why they have not taken too well.

Huntingfield MG Trust is not the only community orchard that has suffered - Wenhaston and a number of other

orchards are in a similar position. Paul Read, of Orchard East, has kindly provided a small selection of maiden trees and these will be planted along side the existing trees which will remain until they have been inspected by a team of specialists.

Also, as a result of the successful grafting course held at the Hub last year, run by Paul Read, Tony Howe and Jim Wardale have successfully raised a small number of grafted maiden trees which will also be planted.

The HMGT are very grateful for a grant of £1,000 awarded by the Groundwork project, sponsored by Tesco.

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Nature Notes



Listen out for the Chiffchaff calling

At the time of writing we have had some quite cold windy days so certainly not spring-like weather. Thankfully the forecast for the next

few days is good with much warmer temperatures and southerly winds. This should provide ideal conditions for migrant birds, which have been a bit slow arriving this year (held up by the cool air) to flood into the UK. I have heard that harbinger of Spring, the Chiffchaff singing in a few local sites. Other early migrants such as the Sand Martin and Swallow have eluded me although a handful of each have been seen in Suffolk.

We should also see an increase in insect life: bees are already active and butterflies will appreciate warm days and start to visit local flowers looking for nectar. The pale-yellow Brimstone is usually one of the first species seen on the wing with Peacocks and Small Tortoiseshell flitting around soon.



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I recently helped local moth expert, Matthew Deans, to set up his moth traps. It was his first surveying session as part of his work studying local moth populations. Again, as it has been unseasonably chilly, not

that many moths have been active hence the variety of species that we found was also reduced. The moths we did attract with the powerful lamp had a distinctly religious feel as most of them were either Common or Small Quakers.



Although spring will see an arrival of summer visitors, at the moment we still have good numbers of winter visiting birds

present locally. Helen has had several Siskins using feeders in her garden. These are small, green and black finches closely related to Goldfinches. They breed in northern forests but travel south during cold weather. At the moment they will be fuelling up on her seed ready for their return journey.

Most notable was up to a thousand Fieldfare feeding in fields near my house. These are grey and brown thrushes, close relatives of the Blackbird and Song Thrush. They gather in flocks prior to their own northward journey back to the breeding areas in Scandinavia.



Recently there has been a notable passage of Red Kites through Suffolk I saw four in just one morning. As with the Thrushes these birds generally seem to be heading



north east. They are large, Buzzard-sized raptors with a delicate flight and a deeply forked tail

that they use rather like a rudder to steer. They are a lovely chestnut colour and are a welcome sight as their numbers declined in the 1960s to just a few birds left in Wales.

So do keep an eye out in the next few days for returning summer visitors such as Swallows and other local wildlife that will be active on the back of some nice gardening weather.
