On Wednesday 11th May we held three meetings in The Hub. At the first, the Annual Parish Meeting, we heard annual reports from the PC and village societies; the Hub, Millennium Green, Church and Kids Club. The second meeting was the AGM of the Parish Council. Emma decided to step down as Chair and, you can deduce from the name at the top of this piece, who pulled the short straw to succeed her. Edward Watson was voted in as Vice-Chair. We are still looking for a new Clerk and RFO to replace Julie Collett who will stand down at the end of June (see page 2).

The third meeting was the first of the new Parish Council. It was mostly a routine meeting but there were one or two things of note. The Highways department has come back to us to say that they cannot leave specific verges uncut as we had requested. This is due to a variety of issues all relating to visibility and safety. We gave our approval to the plans submitted for the development of Laundry Studio. We also had a discussion about parking at the junction of Holland Rise and The Street. It is a tight corner and a narrow road: if cars are parked too close to the junction it is very difficult for wider traffic to negotiate the corner. I agreed to talk to the residents concerned and report back to the next meeting which is July 13th, 7pm at the Hub.

Nature Notes

A few days ago I took a very pleasurable stroll through our lovely churchyard at St Mary's. It was good to see a large proportion of the grassy areas that have been left to grow long. This management strategy now seems to be adopted in many churchyards, which is a brilliant as it encourages many varieties of wildlife to flourish. I noted colourful Cowslips, Red Campion and floating over the grasses (which included amongst other species Cocksfoot and Catstail) was the tall, creamy Cow Parsley. Honey and Bumble bees were buzzing and the birdsong included two summer migrants, a Chiffchaff with its squeaky wheelbarrow impersonation and a Blackcap chortling away. A real joy for the ears.



I then spotted a movement in the grass and caught a fleeting glimpse of a Slow worm as it made its way under a piece of bark - very exciting. Slow

worms are reptiles which measure about nine inches long

and, despite appearances, they are not a snake but a legless lizard. If you look closely, unlike snakes they have eyelids. They are decreasing in numbers but well managed grassy sites will support a healthy population and they will be courting at the moment. They lay live young in compost heaps or log piles which provide somewhere warm for the young to grow. So, a compost heap tucked away in a grassy area is a way to help this beautiful reptile.



Recent sightings at the Heveningham Hall lakes included a rare White Stork and a pair of Common Terns on the newly installed tern raft. Common Terns arrive in April and travel back to their

wintering grounds in August/September. They have one of the longest migration distances of any of our summer migrants, averaging around 35,000km a year. Some winter in the Southern Ocean near South America, Africa or even South Asia. So it's brilliant to see them in Huntingfield.

There's a Giant Tipi appeared at Whitehouse Farm, Cratfield.....



If you have a "Mobbs' Turkey" for Christmas you may already know The Mobbs Family at Whitehouse Farm in Cratfield, but now we are branching out into a new venture.

Over the 150 years that the Mobbs family has

been in Cratfield we have had to adapt and change. In the late 1800s William Mobbs moved from Starston to Cratfield to run the village shop and post office, he then moved into farming and his son Percy Mobbs was established at Cantley Farm. Percy's sons, Roy and Russell Mobbs had to respond to changes in agriculture – moving from pigs and blackcurrants to turkeys and arable crops and also into contracting, owning the first combine harvester in the district. Recently as the fourth and fifth generation, we have increasingly felt it was time for another change, to benefit the environment, enhance the local community and strengthen the future of our small family farm, so we have decided to embark on a new project that involves providing more space for wildlife on our farm and a new venue in our community offering pop up suppers and a Sunday brunch café.

The principles of Field to Fork are already at the heart of our approach to producing our Christmas Turkeys as we continue to feed our turkeys the traditional way on home grown corn that we prepare for them each morning. However, we want to take this further and so have decided to become part of the Countryside Stewardship Scheme which will mean we can grow a greater variety of crops for the turkeys, but also rewild other parts of the farm to encourage more plant, insect and bird life. Inspired by the success of farm open days and our butterfly meadows a couple of years ago we also want to make the farm more accessible to local people and visitors.



So, we are opening Fire and Feast Suffolk at the farm in June. Fire and Feast is based around things that we love – local food, cooking on wood and being outdoors. While there will be a small campsite, the main part of Fire and Feast is the dining tipi. The Giant Fire and Feast Tipi will be the venue for

Saturday night rustic suppers, which we hope will appeal to local people, as well as those visiting the area, and also a Sunday Brunch Café where there will be coffee, homemade cakes, brunch plates etc. In the winter the tipi will move into our Fire and Feast Barn for cosy indoor events.

The recent drop of rain has freshened the grass although the downside of the drought was the seeding of many of the grass species so our home turf may look a little scruffy for a while.

By the time you read this the shearers should have visited. Gosh we can't wait for a new hair-do and get rid of that winter duvet surrounding us. Our lambs are marching on: the team weighed some whilst worming a couple of weeks ago and a number were in excess of 25kg. Our market weight is around 45kg so we have a bit of time yet.

Talking of old Floppy Hat - he has recently taken on a new 15year-old 'Saturday' boy (Levi) who seems like a nice lad. He's pretty enthusiastic, which will please the team. The first thing to teach him will be sheep speaky as I can't be telling him about my aches and pains and him not understanding me.

We have all been treated for fly strike so the next couple of months should be plain sailing - famous last words eh! We know the Country Fair is getting close because we are being moved regularly to keep the grass nice and short for you people on the days. Please pick up your litter so we don't cut our feet on empty cans and other detritus.

That's about it for now folks. Enjoy the summer.

This is a wonderful season for us ruminants with copious amounts of fresh green grass, some of it going through our system quite

quickly and coming out much like green paint. Oh, but it is delicious and we are putting on weight which pleases the boss. I overheard Lucy and he commenting the other day that maybe some humans locally had also been enjoying a better than average diet this spring: don't know what they are on about?!

We have all been given a worm prevention injection behind the ear lasting for 6 months together with a vaccination for a nasty bacteria called "Black leg" and we

will have monthly fly control treatment during the fly season. The 'so-and-so's' gather around our eyes for the moisture from our tear drops and infect us with New Forest Disease - sometimes referred to as 'Pink eye'. It is very painful and invariably makes us blind.

The youngest cattle - those near the footpath by the Queen's Oak - are getting extra cereal daily until their rumens are sufficiently developed to cope with grass alone, usually around 8 months. We, more mature, girls are waiting for the new boyfriends to arrive, yay! Old Floppy Hat's son went to Carlisle recently and bought a few exceptional young chaps for this season. Unfortunately, some of our older bulls failed their semen motility test this spring which means they are now burgers...

The silage season is nearly upon us: any surplus grass growing away from the hungry mouths is mown and put into giant bin liners for use during the winter when grass stops growing. It also freshens up the grass to give us some fresh succulent product to feast on, hooray! The boss tells us the future is looking promising for what we are good at, turning grass that you humans can't eat into food you can, unless of course you develop a few more stomachs! So right back to my earlier comment: maybe some have already?? Will that mean you might start mooing?


grants to help individuals in need with household costs. A further grant is given each year to the fabric fund of the Church of St Mary's Huntingfield.




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Weather report: April - May 2022



With the sun shining and a breezy wind I must say that, despite low rainfall for the past two months, everything in the garden looks rosy – well, lovely and green anyway. April this year was ever so slightly damper than last year. The so called ‘April showers’ duly arrived in May, a month late.


Temperatures have been around average for the last two months which is why most things outside look well. Had there been some very warm weather the state of the crops and gardens would have been a very different picture.

As you can see from the table we have seen less rain than the same period last year. There is no appreciable amount in the near outlook but no great heat either so perhaps it will mean limited damaging effects on the vegetation. Over the latter part of the coming weekend (30/31st) the forecast is decidedly cool. However, rainfall year to date I've recorded 6.52" (165.6mm) compared with 9.25" (234.95mm) last year, so there is quite a difference. The meteorologists say the spring anomalies we are currently experiencing are part of weather changing trends.

On that note, cheerio for now, enjoy the summer!

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Budding Ideas



After the downpours in May it seems a bit potty to be going on about drought but unfortunately, as the last few years have

shown, drought is an increasing problem, particularly here in the East. As the temperatures rise, the weather calms and increased light and warmth over the coming weeks plants will need plenty of water and feed to sustain them through the growing season.

The best approach is to prioritise: established plants should not need a huge amount of extra watering as they will have developed a deep root system and can pretty much keep themselves going on whatever rain arrives - although my several Hydrangeas tell me pretty quickly if they are suffering from insufficient water. Be observant - a plant will tell you by wilting if it is not happy and the quickest fix is to water over the leaves. This ensures that the poorly plant absorbs the water quickly, but do not do this in direct sunshine.

Watering early-morning or late-evening reduces the level of evaporation and allows the plants to benefit fully from the soaking you are gifting them. Whilst you



are watering, spare a thought for our feathered friends: clean and top up birdbaths and leave out shallow dishes

or trays of fresh water to help birds and other wildlife which we are encouraged to support in our gardens.

If you have containers or hanging baskets make sure that you feed and water regularly. It takes no time at all for them to dry out so it should be pretty much a daily part of your gardening routine. And, pardon the expression, BUTTS BUTTS BUTTS! Everyone has a downpipe, a greenhouse roof, guttering, etc. that allows precious water to drain away unless you put in a butt. Please install one wherever you can - you will have a wonderful natural water source and your plants will be happier for it. At this point I should say I would happily help anyone install a butt, but...



If you are lucky enough to be going away on holiday, find a kindly neighbour to water

your precious plants whilst you are away - move pots into the shade so that they do not dry out so quickly. Try using water retaining crystals - they really DO work. And, if some kind soul does volunteer to water your potted babies, move them all together in one spot as it makes life so much easier.

At this stage, your lawn might start to be looking a bit tired but, honestly, do not waste your time watering it - it can dry out completely, go brown and then, before you know it, the rain starts and it will green up double quick. If you have managed to get a spring weed and feed on the lawn and you have aerated and scarified then it has the best chance to weather any adverse conditions and come back with a vengeance. Concentrate on your containers and baskets over the next couple of months and the rest have to earn their place in the garden.

Only two residents were present to have their say and one other resident sent apologies with various comments. The main concern within the village continues to be the amount and speed of traffic. Talks are on-going with Cllr Burroughes.
