SATURDAY BUS SERVICE TO GO

Our local bus service, the 121 route to and from Ipswich and Halesworth, is being cut from April this year, it was announced in the Beccles and Bungay Journal. However, the 532 route will not be affected. That is the bus that runs from Huntingfield to Halesworth at 9.43 in the mornings. It returns from Halesworth at 14.45 each weekday with an extra bus leaving Halesworth at 12.15 on Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday.

The County public transport budget is to be cut from £4.2m to £1.9m. What will that mean for residents who use the 121 service? There will be **NO** bus service to Ipswich as there is at the present time, with **NO** bus services at all on Saturdays. *Sue Lucas*

Weather report: August - September 2023

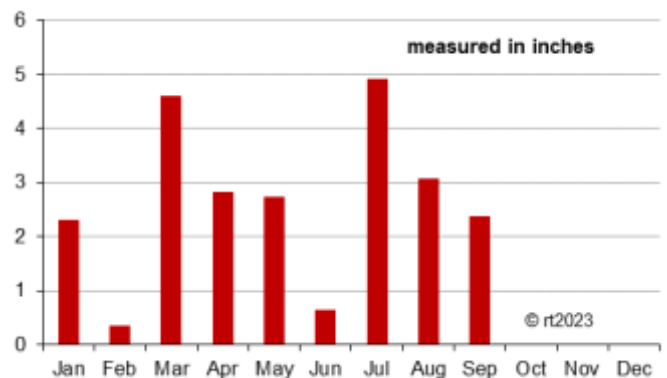


We're nearly at the end of September already. With the summer nearly over, this September is proving to be one of the warmest on record. The month provided us with some lovely warm days which saved us from a very nondescript summer.

Rainfall for the last 2 months has totalled more than for their respective months last year with 5.45" (138.43mm) recorded compared with 2.87" (72.89mm) and maybe even a little more before the end of the month. Noticeably, there have been some quite heavy

showers locally along with one or two breezy spells that were the remnants of Atlantic storms (ex-hurricanes) driven by a meandering jet-stream.



This year-to-date rainfall totals are higher than for the respective totals last year. So far, 23.84" (605.54mm) has been recorded compared with 11.91" (302.51mm). There was around 10" (250 mm) of rain in the last 3 months of last year. Whether the next 3 months will see as much rain falling remains to be seen, as will the likelihood of much snow! There may well be a few more windy episodes, as this is time of the year for them.

David's Column

As well as a full hand of councillors we had 9 residents and District Councillor, Julia Ewart attend our last Parish Council meeting.

The repeated flooding of the Bridge Street/The Street junction was reported to the Highways department following our previous meeting. Highways have subsequently inspected the site and reported it as a low priority item! We decided to assess the situation with a view to clearing the ditch out ourselves. Also, on the subject of village infrastructure, it has been noticed that there are several new vertical cracks in the bridge. These will be reported to Highways via the portal.

We are still open to receive costed proposals for projects on which to spend the CIL money. Please let us know if you have any suggestions.

The turnover of people moving into and leaving Huntingfield has led to the decision to refresh the village e-mail list. You will have found a form in this month's Hare. If you want to be on the list, please complete the form and drop it into the suggestions box on the wall of The Hub.

Finally, we inspected and approved the latest plans for the renovation of Huntingfield Hall on the understanding that it is to be used by family members. It was noted that (coincidentally) at long last The Old School House is in the process of being redecorated, at least externally, and is now once more looking like a building for the village to be proud of.

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Notes from the sheep pen...

Hello to you all on this 100th edition of the Hare. I am a relatively new correspondent but enjoy telling you what is happening in our field. It's probably a little repetitive but, if you are anything like old Floppy Hat, it won't matter as he struggles to remember what happened last month, let alone last year!



It should be a relatively quiet time for the team but the work hasn't eased up. I mentioned the level of Scald infection last issue and, as we munch our way through the

summer months in what have been exceptional growing conditions it has caused havoc, necessitating numerous foot baths and has been oh so tiresome for all concerned. Routine vaccination helps as a preventative but is a long way off 100% effective. Also, have you noticed how many flies this spell of hot weather has brought out? Fortunately, the team regularly treat us with an insecticide to dissuade them from laying their eggs on our fleece, which then hatch into maggots that burrow into our flesh. Unless treated this is invariably fatal for us within a few days.

The lambs have been vaccinated twice against *Pasteurellosis*, one of the most common causes of pneumonia in sheep. We are also treated for stomach worms every 4-6 weeks after our poo samples have been analysed by the vet to ensure they are using the right product for any particular build up. This year we are also seeing a big increase in *Coccidiosis*, imported

with some replacement stock. This nasty infection is not noticeable to the eye but is highly transmissible to younger stock. It affects their intestines and thus the ability to absorb nutrients from their feed which makes recovery a very long process.

After a list of our woes, on to brighter matters. The breeding season is fast approaching so we have all had our MOT's, meaning teeth and udders, and are raring to go. The boyfriends are looking pretty 'hunky' and in good fettle for the job in hand.

On to the sheep dog trials: not quite *One Man and his Dog*, but pretty up there. Lucy remains enthusiastic and with some success. Her dogs work with many hundreds of us on a daily basis and can occasionally be a little *pushy* (technical term) At trials there are just five of us on a run so it's a big difference for them.



The team are holding a charity trial, the proceeds of which are going to Macmillan Nurses Fund. Over 50 dogs will be competing from all over the country so it should be great and we will do our best to cooperate! Unfortunately, it will have taken place before you receive this issue.

That will do for the moment so, baa for now!

...and the cowshed



It's lovely to have the chance to tell you what's happening in our pasture. What a wonderful grazing year we have had! Sun and rain produced oceans of grass and we have made great use of it.

In the main we are young stock, ranging in age at the start of spring from 4 to 18 months and grouped

according to age. The younger ones have additional daily processed cereal for a few months until they are able to cope with grass alone. This coincides with the development of their Rumen (the largest of their four stomach compartments). In the summer and early autumn, the team introduce dry feed supplement as the quality of the grazing deteriorates. When the weather turns, they are taken back to the home farm into sheltered accommodation and fed conserved forage that was made during the productive months. The older ones can grow at up to a Kg/day purely on well managed grass.

We all receive a long-term wormer prior to turning out and are regularly treated for nuisance flies that can transmit an eye infection called *New Forest disease*. This year control has been spot-on, with not a single case, great! The older animals also return to the home farm for final finishing over the winter.

Now on to us older girls: we are the autumn calving group who are due during September. Having spent the summer by the beach at Henham we are now at Sibton, ready to calve outside under the close supervision of the team. Our calves are tagged and castrated (where necessary) within the first 12 hours, before they become too frisky. As I write, only one of us has needed assistance with a breach presentation - successfully delivered by Floppy Hat and Lucy back at Green Farm. We will then stay outside, probably back at the sand heap known as Henham, and fed the hay that was conserved during June.

Onto the next piece of interesting and quite exciting news: the team are in the process of helping establish a small herd of Wagyu beef cattle. Some frozen embryos were purchased from a famous herd in Scotland and implanted into recipient heifers that the team had already programmed. They are now nurturing them with fingers crossed. They will be scanned within a month and preliminary results are looking promising.

The resulting progeny should be greatly sought after for their eating quality!

History Corner: Sarah Edwards of Ubbeston

In the Ubbeston Parish records an entry for 12th September 1707 reveals the cruel story of an unmarried woman, Sarah Edwards, who had the misfortune to fall pregnant by a married man. As a result of what was considered a terrible sin by the Church at the time, she was humiliated in front of the whole congregation at St Peter's Church in her home village of Ubbeston. There is no mention of any such treatment of the father of her child. There is, however, an entry in the church burial records for the previous year: in 1706 Sarah Edwards, an infant, was buried. This suggests that Sarah lost the aforementioned child, which adds more sadness to the story.

The entry in the parish records states: 'The form of penance to be performed by Sarah Edwards for committing the crime of adultery as follows..

'Imprimus – the said Sarah Edwards shall upon a Sunday after the second peal for Morning Prayers come into the Church Porch of Ubbestone and there shall stand until the second lesson be ended arrayed all the while in a white sheet down to the feet with a white wand in her hands and a prayer pinned upon her breast exhibiting her offence and shall ask for forgiveness of those that come to the church.

Item – the second lesson being ended the Minister shall receive her into the congregation and being placed before the Minister's desk with her face to the congregation and standing upon a [pesse] shall make penitently the confession following saying after the Minister in an audible voice...

'I, Sarah Edwards, do acknowledge and confess that I have most grievously offended Almighty God and provoked his just wrath and indignation against me by committing the sin of Fornication – I am heartily sorry for this my great sin and offence and I do most sincerely beg of God Almighty pardon and forgiveness thereof and to grant me his grace of true repentance and reverence therein, and that I may never commit the like sin any more but lead an honest and sober life for the time to come and to that end I desire this Congregation to join with me in Prayer to the Almighty God saying, 'Our Father...'

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Nature Notes

Firstly, heartfelt congratulations to our brilliant editorial team on the production of the 100th edition of the Hare. The first was in 2007 and it's an amazing feat to have carried out all the behind the scenes work to reach the century issue. Well done team! It would also be really good to be celebrating the fact that wildlife and biodiversity in the UK over that time had seen an uptick in population size and number of species. Sadly, that is not the case as the recently published 'State of the Nature' report did not make good reading.

This 200-page report prepared by 60 organisations, including scientists, conservation groups and government agencies concluded that nearly 20% of mammals, plants, insects, amphibians and birds are threatened. Plus 1,500 species of UK plants and



animals such as the Turtle Dove and Dormouse are approaching extinction. This is shocking news in these enlightened

times and underlines the fact that Britain is one of the most wildlife depleted countries in the world. Something that we really should be ashamed of.

There is some good news: nature can achieve some great comebacks from the brink with our help. Most people will have seen a magnificent Red Kite floating over a motorway, or even locally. Thirty years ago, they were



restricted to a few pairs in Wales and now, following inspired relocations, their population has soared to around 2,000 pairs.

Habitat reinstatement projects such as reedbeds have led to species like the Bittern rising from 11 pairs in 1997 to now around 250. Rewilding projects like our local Wilderness Reserve are also burgeoning. Adding a wide variety of habitats, from wetland to heaths and woodland etc. across the UK has seen many species

increase at these sites. White Storks are breeding at Knepp in Sussex and the aforementioned Red Kite is breeding locally on the Wilderness Reserve.



So, we can achieve great things but more must be done if we are to avoid these predicted declines. What are the

answers? Well, it's a very complicated situation.

Farmers, unfairly, seem to get some of the blame, but our 60 million population all need feeding and food security is now becoming a major concern. Increasingly importing food just moves the reduction in biodiversity to other countries. This could lead to similar species losses and threatened habitats overseas which is also not a good outcome.

Obviously growing fields of just one plant does not encourage wildlife so more diverse habitats would be an improvement. Encouraging farmers with grants to re-wild productive land and, conversely, to pay them to plant crops on unsuitable land, e.g. marshy areas, seems illogical. Surely we should optimise food



production on fertile land? We have more and more technology such as drones etc. coming onstream to assist. Then, improve agriculturally poor land such as heaths and wetland and upland as wildlife habitat.

Hopefully, all the parties involved in the report, especially the government, can work together to solve these very worrying issues. Like climate change, we have the tools to closely monitor and improve the situation so, hopefully, by the time we get to the 200th issue of the Hare we will see some major improvement.
