Sheepish update

The ladies are all due from 28th March. Unfortunately, over at Heveningham, several delivered premature lambs that didn't survive. Their little lungs are not fully formed to sustain breathing until they are born full term. Those that have

survived are extra small and have been taken back to the farm for warmth and TLC until they are a bit stronger. Today (28th March) there were 9 lambs born on the corner field at Huntingfield, all fully formed and healthy so it should all be plain sailing for the new mums



and babies. They should all be finished lambing in around 35 days: the boys only have a brief holiday in with the ladies, so as to not prolong the lambing season. Fingers crossed for the sun coming out and it warming up during the next few weeks.

Just a quick reminder to please keep your dogs on a lead when near the sheep. They're heavily pregnant and will not cope with stress at this time. They are also prone to getting stuck on their backs or even on their side. If you notice a sheep stranded in this position, please feel free to go over and roll them onto their feet, or let me know so I can check. They normally look back at you and say thank you as they run away. I like to think that's what they're saying anyway...

The brown lambs over at Heveningham are Black Welsh Mountain Sheep. When they are shorn, they are jet black, only when the wool starts to grow back does it fade to brown. They're a lovely looking lamb (now coming up to a year old) and prefer to graze on lower quality grass than the other lambs. They also tend to hang around in their own little gangs, normally looking for mischief, or, if they can, escape and cause mischief. However, they're quick to jump back over the fence to where they should be once they see of my dogs on their tails (not literally!!!).



Mobile Library





Weather report: Feb-March 2024

Sitting here writing my bit for the Hare, I note that the weather is typically more March-like



and very different from March 2023. The forecast leading up to Easter, however, is looking far less settled with both rain, wind and sunny intervals coupled with slightly less cool temperatures so just right for a holiday period!

So, what's been happening during the past two months and since the beginning of the year. Not much frost to talk of (-1.2C, 2 or 3 nights ago) this month but the rainfall is a very different story with only 1.24" (31.5mm) compared with March 2023 when I recorded 4.59" (116.69 mm) so, as I said earlier, much more typical of March. However, February was certainly a "fill dyke" month: I recorded 4.81" (122.17 mm's) compared with February 2023 when I recorded just .34" (8.64mm's). Quite a difference year on year! So far in 2024 I've recorded 7.40" of rain (187.96mm), compared to last year's 8.64" (219.45 mm), so less this year (yes, really), but there are still a few days of March left to come. Sunshine totals for March so far are below par (hence more cloud) and will barely reach average. For the weather trend for the next two months, it's a case of just wait and see but, suffice to say, I don't expect any big surprises either way!

Nature Notes



Although at the time of writing spring is officially here the weather is generally quite cold with blustery chilling winds.

Thankfully, it has stopped raining and things are drying out and, with longer days, several signs of spring are on show despite a lack of warming sunshine.

Whilst many flowers are in bloom in hedges and gardens the trees are yet to come into full leaf which still gives a wintry feel to the landscape. Already, butterflies in the form of the



Brimstone are visiting the fresh spring flowers in local gardens: its buttery yellow colour is why butterflies are called butterflies.

Other pollinators such as the Buff-tailed Bumblebee are seeking nectar as are many species of moth. Their



beautiful colours are generally unseen by most of us as they go about their nocturnal business. They

will however be noticed by nighttime hunters: bats that have just awoken from their winter hibernation.

These expert flyers include species such as the diminutive Pipistrelle and the largest UK species, the Noctule. They all use sonar, ultrasonic sound waves, that they generate by squeaking. These bounce back from the prey item and is picked up by their ultrasensitive hearing, enabling the bat to swoop down and grab the prey which they usually devour in flight.

Moths will also be laying thousands of eggs on the newly emerging tree leaves. Large numbers of caterpillars will subsequently hatch and start to devour

the fresh green foliage. These, in turn, provide super protein-rich food for young birds and mammals that will hatch out during April and May.



Without species such as Blue and Great Tits and other birds that feed on these caterpillars the trees could be stripped of foliage. It's amazing to think that a pair of Blue Tits will raise a single brood upwards of six young from hatching to fledging in just 14 days. Imagine raising six children to teenage in the same time!

Summer migrant birds will soon be arriving in large numbers. Swallows, House and Sand Martins have already been noted in Suffolk. My first sign of spring is the 'squeaky wheelbarrow' call of the Chiffchaff, already singing locally. Another sound to listen out for is the Cuckoo. Local sightings of this spring icon have increased in recent years because the local population of a 'foster' species, the Reed Warbler has also increased due to the newly-created reedbeds around the Heveningham lakes. So do listen out for the Cuckoo amongst all the other beautiful sights and sounds of spring as the sun strengthens and the weather finally warms up.



History Corner

By the time you read this Laxfield & District Museum will have already opened its doors to visitors for the 2024 season.



One of our new acquisi-tions is the Peasenhall School **Honours Board** showing children, who had earned the privilege of Head Boy, listed as Sir Galahad and Head Girl, described as Maid of Honour, followed by a

list of Senior Prefects from 1929 until war broke out in 1939. We have put the board on display downstairs in the Parish Room. You will probably recognise many familiar local names here.

The museum team started researching the names that appear on the board and one particularly poignant story emerged: that of a Senior Prefect in 1936, Richard Stiff. We were given photographs of Richard, which show him as a young boy tending his horse and then in army uniform.

Richard William Stiff (1923-1943)

Richard Stiff was born in 1923, the son of Lily Ethel Stiff and later, stepson of George Albert Pearce, who was born in Sibton. George was living in Peasenhall when he and Lily married in 1930 and went on to have two children, half siblings to Richard. In 1939 Lily and George, a farm worker, were living with their two youngest at Bungalow Fruit Farm, Peasenhall which appears to be near Manor Farm or Punchard's Farm.

Richard was just 13 years old when his name was added to the Peasenhall School Honours Board as a Senior Prefect in 1936. He subsequently joined the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve during the war, where he served as Flight Sergeant 1335635 in the 423 Squadron. Tragically, he lost his life in a plane crash over the Irish sea in November 1943, aged only 20. The aircraft was flying a convoy escort mission when the crew reported engine trouble and their intention to return to base. Strong sea conditions were reported at the time and the aircraft was lost without trace.

Richard's body was never recovered, but his death in honourable service is commemorated both locally, on the Peasenhall War Memorial, and also on the Runnymede Memorial in Egham, Surrey, dedicated to over 20,000 men and women from the air forces of the British Empire lost in air operations during the war. A sad tale, indeed.

Huntingfield homes

I recently ran a search on the Old Laundry (the pink "shed" next to Laundry Cottage). Looking through previous census' it is difficult to pinpoint exact addresses in the village as there was no house numbering system – so there are numerous entries with the same address, i.e. The Street, Huntingfield. You can only assume that the census collector went from door to door and piece together his path from house to house... although this isn't always necessarily correct.


Of course some are obvious, such as Maltings Cottages, Church Terrace, The Huntingfield Arms and The Post Office Stores. However, the 1939 Register throws up some rather odd addresses that have caused much head-scratching. I can only assume that the names have changed or some no longer exist. So, if anyone can shed any light on the following properties please do get in touch..

Granmere Bungalow (Household head, Frederick Green) and Bungalow Farm (Head, Fred J. Downsborough). These are listed together so I assume they are connected and were, perhaps, located on the Cratfield or Linstead Roads?

Two Fertree (Firtree?) Cottages are listed: one with pensioner Annie Mudd as sole occupant and one with six occupants – the Merry-West family who appear to be Fruit Growers.

One of the most intriguing is a property listed as Labelle Maison! This is the home of retired Estate carpenter Walter Ransby along with William and Elizabeth Newson (Head Gardener and School Teacher) and Farm Carter, Dennis Creasey. An odd name in a rural village in 1939?

There is a listing on Cratfield Road called Duncraggan, home of Charles and Charlotte Anderson and also one for Neaver Farm where the Farm Bailiff, Jethro Page resided. Any ideas on these? Helen Cannon (hcannon50@amail.com)
